LOGLINE

Lena loves her brother Noah. In the desperate attempt to conquer her feelings, she retreats into a world of her own.

SYNOPSIS

The love Lena (16) feels for brother Noah is more than sisterly love. To distract herself, she encourages Noah's friend Enis. But she is so obsessed with her brother that she cannot curb her feelings. She starts daydreaming, living more in a fantasy world than in real life. She finally brings herself to confess to Noah. He is shocked and repels her. Lena embarks on a journey into the unknown.

Director's Statement: Thomas Imbach

As a filmmaker I always try to chart new territory but there are constants in my work as well. GLAUBENBERG returns to the subject of madness, addressed in other films, like Happiness Is a Warm Gun (2001), Lenz (2006) or Mary Queen of Scots (2013).

Though inspired by my own biography, GLAUBENBERG is extremely fictionalized. It is about a form of love that is taboo in our society, about the love of a sister for her brother – a love so intense that it is experienced as a form of madness. The film concentrates on the adolescence of the protagonists, when this passion – of basically innocent and healthy origins – manifests itself for the first time. I experienced similar developments in my family and am still dealing with the long-term consequences.

The idea for the film occurred to me when I had a studio stipend in Appenzell and was working on Mary. Seeing the Alpstein and Säntis mountain massifs made me think of the Glaubenberg in central Switzerland. There we children once visited my father, who was in basic training, and one of the soldiers in the barracks gave us military biscuits. I have never returned but the name "Glaubenberg" (literally: mountain of faith) always sounded so curiously enigmatic to me and it gave the impetus for this story.

While working on the script, I discovered the legend of Byblis and Kaunos in Ovid's Metamorphoses. It came as a great surprise to find my story condensed in the six pages I had just read. Ovid's tale covered everything that was important to me and became the structure for my screenplay about a teenager today.

Back in 1997, the world of 16 to 18 year olds was already the subject of my feature documentary Ghetto, which tells authentic stories of young people on the threshold of adulthood. Now, 20 years later, I have narrowed that threshold down to a specific emotion that 90% of my protagonist's peers would probably consider totally "off-the-wall". It marks a time in our lives when everything that is "off-the-wall" seems interesting and important.

My film explores a passion that is often reduced to superficial psychological interpretation: by transferring feelings for her father to her brother rather than to an outside object of love, the girl misses out on "normal" development. To me, the attraction between sister and brother is rather a consequence of an inner, unconscious desire for the impossible.

Psychological explanations mean less to me than the intensity and unconditional urgency of Lena's feelings. I feel that her single-mindedness can also be interpreted as a strength. Lena is a powerful figure for me.

In this way, GLAUBENBERG is a sequel to Mary: a filmed homage to a young woman who has the courage to ignore peer pressure and to be resolute in the pursuit of her own path. That is what GLAUBENBERG is about; it is also about the price that has to be paid for refusing to compromise.

GLAUBENBERG - Storyline

Lena is an intelligent and very pretty 16-year-old. She lives with her older brother Noah and her parents in an old house in Oerlikon (Northern Zürich). Noah, a likable young man of 19, has just successfully completed his baccalaureate and is eager to get on with his life but Lena does not want to let him go.

It is the evening of Noah's graduation party. Lena has dolled herself up for the occasion. Noah appears in jeans and a shirt. They tease one another. While Noah performs a musical skit in the auditorium, his sister doesn't take her eyes off him. In his song, he makes humorously ironic fun of one of his teachers and Lena is convinced that he is singing about Julia, his young chemistry teacher. Right away Lena is obsessed by the idea that the relationship between Noah and Julia has secretly gone beyond that of pupil and teacher. That same evening, Praise punches Noah for breaking up with her best friend so callously. Lena dabs the scrape on his forehead and stays by his side. Towards the end of the evening, we see the siblings dancing in a close embrace to a song that means a lot to them.

That night Lena wakes up bathed in sweat. She has just had an erotic dream about her brother. On the way to the kitchen she sees her brother sleeping half naked on the couch. She wakes him up, teases him and playfully seeks body contact.

When the family sees Noah off at the airport – he is going to Izmir as an archaeological intern – Lena is practically heartbroken. Sitting in the back of the car on the way home, she listens to music on her earphones and drifts off into childhood memories.

Lena waits impatiently for news from Noah. Everyone except her has heard from him in Turkey. She starts flirting with Enis, a close friend of Noah's.

Lena meets Julia, who has now become her teacher as well. She wants to find out what's going on between Julia and her brother. The encounters between Julia and Lena become increasingly surreal. We are suddenly no longer sure whether they are actually taking place or are a figment of Lena's imagination. Suddenly, Julia knows about Lena's passion for Noah; the minute Lena looks away, Julia disappears and Noah is sitting opposite Lena. They kiss fervently. Lena wakes up bathed in sweat again; Noah has vanished in the daylight.

Lena tries to cope. Plagued by her dreams, the nights become a constant conflict with forbidden feelings, so much so that she decides to stop sleeping. She wanders the streets at night and ends up falling asleep during class. In this state of confused fatigue, Julia becomes Lena's confidante. In imagined and real conversations in the chemistry lab at school, they brainstorm scenarios for dealing with Lena's passion.

Lena leads Enis on and he falls in love with her. They play around in the park and make out in the car. Enis wants to sleep with her but Lena just laughs and gives him a beanie, Noah's winter beanie. When Lena learns that Noah plans to come home for Christmas, she sneaks into his room, smells his clothes and hangs a picture of him on the wall next to the bed.

Enis has invited Lena to go to an exhibition. When he comes to pick her up, she tells him her parents aren't at home and takes him up to Noah's room, where she seduces him, constantly looking at her brother's photograph while they make love.

Lena goes to the airport to pick up Noah but his friends are already there greeting him. She is convinced that he has come back because of Julia, who was once a student of their mother, Cécilia, and had given Noah some people to contact in Turkey.

To celebrate Noah's arrival, their parents have a Christmas dinner to which they also invite Julia and Enis. They are not aware that Enis and Lena have just broken up and Lena is unpleasantly surprised when he arrives. Enis suddenly loses it and tells everyone at the table in detail about how obsessed Lena is with her brother. Noah impulsively breaks a glass over Enis's head.

After that disastrous evening, Lena and Noah drive up to Glaubenberg. They fool around in the snow, kidding each other like children, and rediscover a boulder from their childhood, with aquatic fossils on it. In the mountain restaurant, Noah tries to confront Lena but she simply ignores him and says she's going to join him when he goes back to Izmir. He is vehemently opposed to the idea.

One morning, Cécilia reaches out to her daughter and asks her why she broke up with Enis. Lena flies into a rage, shouting that it's none of her business.

A few days later, Noah packs up and goes back to Turkey. He refuses to have Lena see him off.

Lena convinces herself that Julia took him to the airport. In desperation, she decides to write to Noah and confess her love for him. She sends him the letter along with cookies that she baked for him. On delivering the package in Izmir, the courier says that a reply has been requested. Noah refuses and opens up the package in the presence of his girlfriend Meriem. He is shocked by the letter but brushes it off, telling Meriem it's just greetings from his family.

Lena is devastated when she finally learns that the package arrived and Noah refused to reply. Julia gets involved and wants to send Lena to the school psychiatrist. Lena withdraws and travels alone to Izmir.

Instead of Noah, she meets his girlfriend and learns that Noah has left her. As if to comfort Meriem, Lena maliciously tells her that Noah is always running away from his girlfriends.

Lena tries to find Noah but there are no bus connections because it's not the busy season yet. She is stranded at a bus stop and can barely communicate. She meets a German-Turkish woman who is a truck driver. She takes her along part of the way and offers to have her spend the night but Lena wants to reach her destination in one day. The driver leaves her by the roadside. Lena drags her suitcase along a gravel path. It bursts open, her clothes fall out and she kicks it down the hill in frustration. While trudging along, she gets entangled in an emotional argument with Noah.

Exhausted, she finally reaches what she thinks is the digging in Aphrodisias. Instead, it is an imposing amphitheater where an animator has organized Turkish folk music and is dancing in the arena with a group of tourists.

When she asks about the digging, she learns that it was postponed because the funding didn't come through. Where is Noah? Could he be looking for her? Lena collapses in exhaustion and disappointment. A Scottish couple look after her and comfort her. She travels back to Izmir with the group of tourists and falls asleep in the coach.

Lena travels on to the Glaubenberg of her childhood. She finds the fossil rock again and sends Noah a selfie of herself on the boulder. Completely caught up in her obsession, she asks random tourists whether they have seen Noah. Her behavior is increasingly erratic. At the hotel she asks if Noah has

arrived. A young French couple invite her for a picnic. She tells them that Noah will be coming any minute.

Utterly immersed in "her" landscape, Lena throws herself onto the boulder. Her tears flow with such intensity that she turns into a spring.

When Noah finally comes to look for his sister, he discovers a rivulet coming out of the boulder. Pensively he lets the water run through his fingers, the tears streaming down his face.

ZSOFIA KÖRÖS – Lena



Zsofia Körös was born in Hungary 1999 and grew up with her family in Switzerland. She spent a semester in Pennsylvania as an exchange student in 2014. In 2018 she received her baccalaureate at the Kantonsschule Zürich Nord. Thomas Imbach discovered her in 2015 during extensive casting in Zurich's schools. After passing a number of rounds in the casting process, she spent over a year preparing for the shooting of Glaubenberg. During that time, she was coached by the experienced actress Marija Skaricic (lead in Das Fräulein by Andrea Staka).

Zsofia will start her science-oriented studies at the ETH in Zurich this fall (2018) and plans to continue working on her career as an actress at the same time.

Thomas Imbach (*1962) is an independent filmmaker based in Zurich. With his production company Bachim Films he produced his own work until 2007. Then he founded Okofilm together with Director/ Producer Andrea Staka. All his films have been released theatrically. He has won numerous awards for his work, both in Switzerland and abroad. With Well Done (1994) and Ghetto (1997) he established his trademark audiovisual style based on a combination of cinemaverité camera-work and fast-paced computercontrolled editing.
